HOW YOU EARN MONEY

- If you click on retail list under Quick links at the very bottom, you will see a complete list of retailers/ restaurants with a percentage after each listing. That percentage is what the rebate is based on. For instance Kohl's is 4%. If you purchased a Kohl's gift card for \$100, the rebate is \$4. What you earn for purchasing that gift card is \$2. The "rebate split" is 50/50 50 percent goes to you, 50 percent goes to St. Mary's.
- Note Kohl's gift cards purchased through our Scrip Program can be used to pay your Kohl's Bill!
- Our current "Scrip Year" ends March 31. Anyone that has ordered gift cards from our Scrip Program from September 26 to March 31 will have a rebate credit posted to their tuition account during the month of April. If you have paid your tuition in full, you have the option to put the credit towards your next year's tuition or receive a check. Anyone with a graduating senior, you will receive a check (you can continue to utilize the Scrip Program after your child graduates and continue to receive a check).

Students must learn to think critically

According to a recent survey of college professors, today's high school graduates are not prepared for the expectations they'll face in college. A lack of critical thinking skills is cited as one of the reasons.

Of the instructors surveyed, 82 percent found that less than half of their students had the critical thinking skills they needed to be successful.

In schools, teachers are focusing more on deeper learning and critical thinking. This means your teen will not

Teach respect for school and home

Teenagers spend a lot of time speaking to their friends. They often use slang and joke around with one another. And more often than not, they slip into this habit when speaking to teachers or other adults, not realizing that they are being disrespectful.

Talk to your teen about the importance of being respectful to others. Explain what respectful behavior looks like. She can show respect through:

• The way she speaks. Your teen should speak slowly, clearly, and calmly. She should also address people properly by saying, "Good morning, Mr. Jones" or using their titles, such as "Yes, Officer." And of course, using the magic words — please and thank you — is always a (Continued on page 12)

only have to call up a fact but also understand how that fact relates to other ideas.

To support your teen's developing thinking skills:

- Challenge him to form opinions and defend them. For example, if your teen thinks there should be a stop sign in front of the school, ask him why he feels that way. Then encourage him to write a letter to local authorities outlining his ideas.
- Help him see other sides of an issue. Say, "I understand why you feel that way. But there are other people who might say"

- Give him the reasons behind the limits you have set. For example, studies show that more teens are injured in car accidents after midnight. What a great reason to establish a curfew before then!
- Talk about the advertisements when you're watching TV. How are they trying to persuade viewers? Are they effective?

Mock Trial shows improvement in second year

With one year of experience under our belt, St.Mary's Mock Trial Club again entered this state-wide competition. Mr. Schu and eight students dove into this challenging contest of skill and strategy. Assisting Mr. Schu was alum Colleen Malchow, Esq. ('98).

In mid- December, we received the case of *People v. Kelly Roberts*. This was actually an evidentiary/suppression hearing to determine whether the police conducted a lawful search that would allow the admission of evidence in a drug case. It involved under-cover surveillance by the police, "hot pursuit", an emergent situation

due to the fact that a child-care center was next door, and multiple witnesses that had their own agendas. It was quite a juicy case giving ample opportunity to press each side's position.

The Mock Trial Tournament is sponsored by the NYS Bar Association. The Erie County Bar Association, along with a couple dozen of the area's high schools, facilitate the running of the competition. Our "New York State 2016 High School Mock Trial Tournament Materials" booklet included rules, policies, and procedures for the case, as well as trial scripts, affidavits, evidence, related cases and case law, and many pages of appendices.

In our first session at UB, we repre-

sented the prosecution against St. Joe's. The more experienced St. Joe's team, being the defense, edged out our team and took the first round. In the second session a week later against Williamsville North, St. Mary's nearly won. The judge repeatedly talked about how well prepared both teams' witnesses and attorneys were and related that the scores were very close.

The SMHS team was made up a mix of students and included Kendra Ciezki, Lucas Cousins, Marissa Dantonio, Carrie Kidder, Athena Mohamed, Katie Nettie, Alex Paul, and Nathan Waley. Although half the team is graduating, we hope to build upon the knowledge and experience of the underclassmen and recruit new members for next year.



Campus Ministry



great way to show respect.

• Her body language. When your teen smiles, nods, and makes eye contact, she is showing people that she respects them. She should also sit or stand up straight and avoid crossing her arms or rolling her eyes.

• Her overall attitude. By not interrupting others, your teen is also showing respect. She should keep her cool even when she disagrees with what someone is saying. Consideration for another's thoughts and beliefs- even if they differ from her own – is a big

sign of respect.

If your teen uses these methods to show respect, she'll be respected in turn by her teachers, fellow students, friends, and family.
