"When you read the description of this prestigious award, Lynn Tytka immediately comes to mind," said Rebecca Kranz, Principal of St. Mary's High School. "Multitudes of our students over many years have considered her a 'Math Hero' for the incredible amount of time she spends helping her students. Lynn is a 24 -hour teacher: she doesn't stop at dismissal time. She is involved in numerous activities, and she makes herself available to help students morning, noon, and night.
"The entire St. Mary's community is proud to have Lynn as part of our Lancer family and pleased that she was recognized by this national organization for the wonderful things she does every day," Mrs. Kranz concluded.

Mrs. Kranz announced the award to the entire school as part of a recent pep rally, where Mrs. Tytka received a standing ovation from the student body.

Winners of the Math Hero Award are selected based on compelling submissions from nominators on the effective and creative ways teachers work with students in math, drawing on new and advanced approaches. Each Math Hero receives a \$2,500 award and a matching grant for their school.

- Class Participation - Does my son/ daughter participate in class by asking questions and volunteering answers?
- Class Time Management - Does my son/daughter use class time wisely?
- Organization - Does my son/ daughter come to class prepared (homework, textbook, notebook, writing supplies, etc.)?
- Strengths and Weaknesses - What is my son/daughter good at doing in this course? What does he/she need to work on?
- Suggestions for Improvement - What are your suggestions or advice for my son's/daughter's academic success in this class?
- Add other questions tailored to individual courses.
If a parent is unable to pick up the report card on November 19, the student will receive the report card in school the following day.

## Learning is more than just grades

You probably ask your teen how he is doing in school. You may ask how science is going. Or if English is getting any easier.

But what are you really asking? Chances are you want to know how your teen's grades are. That is an important concern, but the learning process is just as important.

Show your teen you are interested in what he is learning, not just his grades, by asking him:

- About the book he is reading. Can he give you a brief summary of the plot? Does the story remind him of anything in his life or of anything he has read before?
- About his most recent test. But don't ask about the grade. Does he think the test was a good way to
measure how well he knew the material? Why or why not?
- About accomplishments in learning. How did he handle the most difficult science problem he recently faced?
- If he has had any class experiences that changed his way of thinking. You may be able to share some of your own school experiences that had a similar effect on you.
Questions like these show your teen that you are interested in what he is thinking. They also show you are concerned about his development. Both of these should let him know that learning is about far more than grades.

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## Peer pressure can be good thing for a teenager

Parents often think of peer pressure as a negative force. But that's only true if your teen is feeling that pressure from negative people!

Here's how to help your teen experience positive peer pressure by encouraging activities that allow him to meet other teens who share his interests and your family's values:

- Encourage participation in extracurricular activities at school. This is probably the easiest way for your teen to meet a positive peer group. If he hasn't joined anything yet, look at the school website together and try to find a club that meets his interests.
- Ask your teen to consider service clubs as well as youth groups at houses of worship. If transportation is a problem, help your teen
arrange a carpool.
- Encourage your teen to entertain friends at your home when you will be there. It's important for you to know who your teen's friends are, and this is a great way to find out! Make your home a favorite hangout spot by offering movies and a variety of snacks.
- Seek out the parents of your teen's friends. Talk with them about the rules they keep and the values they share with their children. You will probably have something in common. And you'll be able to counter your teen when he tells you everyone else is allowed to stay out as late as they want to.
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## Six wishes of teachers

Students who are respectful in school always come out on top. They know how to treat others. They behave in the classroom and pay attention. As a result, they contribute to a productive learning environment and are likely to experience academic success.

Unfortunately, many of today's teens don't understand the importance of manners in the classroom. Remind your teen that teachers appreciate students who:

- Always say please and thank you.
- Listen when the teacher or another classmate is speaking.
- Treat teachers and other students with respect.
- Ask for help in a polite manner.
- Say they're sorry - and mean it - when they do something wrong.
- Express their ideas without putting others down.
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## Discover teen's homework style

Does your teen spend hour after hour on homework that should take no more than two hours to complete? If the answer is yes, experts suggest finding your teen's "homework style."

Ask your teen these questions:

- In which room do you like to do
homework? Being comfortable in
your surroundings can make a big difference in your ability to concentrate.

# Church year is coming to an end 

November is the 11th month and the 11th hour of the Church year. The liturgical season comes to a close as we celebrate the 31st, 32nd, and 33rd Sundays of Ordinary Time; on the last Sunday of November and the liturgical year, the Catholic community will honor Christ as King.

Zacchaeus, the short, who pines to see Jesus, climbs a sycamore tree to get a better view. Jesus calls him by name and dines at Zacchaeus' home. In the process, Zacchaeus has a change of heart and vows to follow Jesus and be just as a tax collector (November 3).

In contrast, the Sadducees attempt to trick Jesus by asking Him a question about the Resurrection. The irony was that the Sadducees did not believe in the resurrection of the body or any life after death (November 10).

The 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time is Luke's "end times" description. Jesus talks of cataclysmic signs announcing His
second coming. Even though we have experienced many of these omens, the Christian Community still awaits. We recognize the presence of His Holy Spirit daily and the presence of Jesus in the sacrament of the Eucharist. Thus will end Ordinary Time.

The last Sunday (November 24) celebrates the Feast of Christ the King. In the Gospel account, the King will mount His throne of the cross and be crowned with thorns. The repentant thief asks the King to be part of His Kingdom and his request is granted.

The plan for us for November is simple; find Jesus, like Zacchaeus; don't misuse the gift of faith, like the Sadducees; be ready for the coming of Christ; and seek forgiveness of sins and accept the gift of eternal life.

To all potential saints, may your Thanksgiving be happy.

- What are the distractions in that room?

Some teens can focus with some background noise. Others require complete peace and quiet.

- Do you like to sit at a desk or table when doing your homework? Or do you feel more comfortable on the floor or in a cozy chair?
- When do you feel most alert? Is that when you do homework? Moving homework time from after dinner to before dinner may make a difference.
- How many breaks do you take? Experts suggest taking short breaks every 30 to 60 minutes. But too many breaks can interfere with concentration.
Based on these answers, have your teen develop a "homework style." The payoff will be more productive homework time! ## Lung cancer is second most common cancer

November is Lung Cancer awareness month. This year, an estimated 228,190 adults ( 118,080 men and 110,110 women) in the United States will be diagnosed with lung cancer.

Lung cancer is the second most common cancer and the leading cause of cancer death for men and women. (source: cancer.org)

It is estimated that 159,480 deaths ( 87,260 men and 72,220 women) from this disease will occur this year.

Lung cancer makes up 14 percent of all cancer diagnoses and 27 percent of all
cancer deaths. For men, death rates have declined consistently for the past two decades, recently at a rate of about 3 percent each year. The death rates for women with lung cancer have stabilized since 2003 after increasing for several decades.

Smoking is the leading cause of Lung Cancer. Over 90 percent of lung cancer deaths result from smoking cigarettes. Smoking has very negative effects on people, which include trouble breathing, increased blood pressure, greater risk of getting an infection, and gum disease. When a person smokes or inhales second hand smoke they are inhaling over 4,000 different chemicals including
nicotine. 69 of these chemicals cause cancer.

Lung cancer is usually preventable as long as you don't surround yourself with smokers or smoke yourself. So make the positive choice and stay tobacco free. Negative choices will affect your health and the health of others (friends and family).

Always make good decisions. Making choices that could harm you increases your risks of disease. The best prevention of lung cancer is abstaining from tobacco use.
